The “SMART Rules” provide 5 simple tips for how children and young people can keep themselves safe online and these are available in British Sign Language and widget symbols, which can be used for children with special educational needs or for children who speak English as an additional language.</p> <p>Childnet have also produced the “Star Toolkit”, which has been designed for use with children and young people with autism spectrum disorders in key stages 3 and 4.</p>

The guide also suggests some resources that will help children get the most out of the internet at home and in the community.</p> <p>Cerebra have also produced a useful infographic ‘Play IT Safe’, which provides tips for staying safe online when using the Internet on your computer and mobile phone. The webpage acknowledges that for many lesbian, gay and bisexual people, the internet can provide a source of hope and support by reaching out to others who share similar experiences.</p>
	<p>http://www.youngstonewall.org.uk/sites/default/files/staying_safe_online_guide.pdf</p>	<p>Stonewall, via their report 'Staying Safe Online,' identify that the risks for lesbian, gay and bisexual young people can be more pronounced, either because they aren't given online safety information which explicitly addresses their concerns, or because they're scared to raise worries for fear of being judged about their sexual orientation.</p> <p>Stonewall have written a guide to help parents, carers and teachers (although the guide could be applied by all professionals) to take very simple steps to make their online safety work relevant to all young people.</p>
